Pupils will be encouraged to develop their own thoughts and opinions through critical thinking and analysis of texts/media. Pupils will learn about high profile campaigns relating to civil rights, local history, environmental causes and UK politics. They will engage in discussions about equality and democracy and explore the segregation of people and the moral/ethical implications. Pupils will focus on developing their critical reading skills through the analysis of a range of non-fiction texts. Through the evaluation of these texts pupils will develop inference skills and learn how to write for task, audience and purpose. They will learn to cultivate and develop their own ideas and how to communicate these ideas through well-structured pieces of writing. The final assessment with review comparison skills developed and the ability for pupils to identify implicit information, writers' methods and relevant quotations.
